"¹⁶ Now Laban had two daughters; the name of the elder was Leah, and the name of the younger was Rachel. ¹⁷ Leah's eyes were weak, and Rachel was graceful and beautiful. ¹⁸ Jacob loved Rachel; so he said, 'I will serve you seven years for your younger daughter Rachel.' ¹⁹ Laban said, 'It is better that I give her to you than that I should give her to any other man; stay with me.' ²⁰ So Jacob served seven years for Rachel, and they seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her."
-Gen 29:16-20

Our Summer Sermon Series is called Joseph: More than a Dream Coat. We'll be looking at Joseph's life from his conflict with his brothers, all the way to the surprise ending in Egypt. But, before we get started with our series, I thought it would be helpful for us to look back a little further in the story.

Tolstoy famously wrote, "Happy families are all alike; every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way." If ever we could find a family where this quote applies, it would be to Jacob and his newly forming family. We remember that Jacob had run away from home after tricking his brother Esau

out of his birthright and their father's blessing. He's come to stay with his mother's family, with her brother Laban. Right away, Jacob is lovestruck with daughter number 2. Rachel is so lovely that he kisses her the first time he meets her and weeps aloud!

Jacob makes an agreement to work for Laban for Rachel's hand. Can't you just see him – head over heels, making googly eyes and giggling? He lives seven years like he's in a dream, just waiting for the fateful day when he and Rachel can finally get married. When Jacob, the one who was always tricking friends and family alike, is tricked by Uncle Laban! Laban pulls the old switcheroo and marries his oldest daughter Leah to Jacob.

Now, we don't know a lot about Leah, but don't you feel some pity for her? The only way she can get married, apparently, is for her dad to trick someone! That...is not the greatest setup for a happy marriage. The scripture tells us that, "Leah's eyes were weak." Some translations replace "weak" with "lovely." It's kind of a confusing word in Hebrew – it could mean soft as in beautiful, tender-hearted, or even fainthearted. Some suggest that her eyes were weak because she suffered and cried so much. Others would say that her eyes were gentle.

Still, she wasn't preferred and yet she was still married. Then, her newly minted husband spent another seven years working to marry her little sister. Think of the conflict in that house! There's sibling rivalry with most any siblings, but to be locked into a marriage where you're so obviously – not even second choice, but no choice at all! Soon, their sibling rivalry explodes into competitive child-birthing. Here, Leah is fertile and Rachel isn't. They fight over their husband, over their children, over circumstances beyond their control. They give their handmaids in marriage to their husband so that they can tally up more and more children for their "side."

What do you think it was like to be a child growing up in that household? Wouldn't you think the kids would pick up on their parents' power struggles and quarrels and hurt feelings and competitiveness? Not only that – the Bible tells us that Leah (and her maid Zilpah) had 9 children whereas Rachel (and her maid Bilhah) had 4 children. If their sibling rivalry chose sides over whose Mom is the best, the team was already well stacked against the children of Rachel and her maid! So, why was Joseph the darling son? Because he was Rachel's firstborn son, even though there had been ELEVEN CHILDREN born before him.

Sometimes we inherit conflicts – from our families, our communities, even our churches. We know that we don't like those other guys because they're not our guys! Our guys are the greatest because – if they weren't great, they wouldn't BE our guys! Sometimes the quickest way to bond a group is to hate the same people, but as the family of Jacob and Leah and Rachel and Zilpah and Bilhah can tell you – that's not going to make for a lot of family harmony and love. God gave us hearts that are big enough and full enough to love those we love without needing to hate those we hate. Loving one doesn't make the next one less than.

For the habits of hating and mocking and needling that we have learned, we ask for grace and wisdom to seek the course of love and peace, this day and always. May we remember to love in a way that heals both us and our families as the God of love has taught us since the beginning. Amen.




Exterior sign changers have included Brenda Cunningham, Stephanie Smith, Millie Spencer, and Barry Straabe.
