Program Notes

Missa brevis Sancti Joannis de Deo - 1775 (Franz Joseph Haydn)

More commonly known as the "Kleine Orgelmesse" (the "Little Organ Mass"), this piece numbers among Haydn's works most popular during the composer's own lifetime. The mass was written in honour of a Portuguese monk known as St. John of God, who founded the Order of the Brothers of Charity. The size of the mass – both in terms of duration and the size of the instrumental ensemble required – was a practical choice for one simple reason: the Order's church in Eisenstadt was very, very small. The organ from which Haydn would have conducted the first performance had only five sets of stops, so it would have been overwhelmed by the trumpets and timpani commonly used in masses held at cathedrals. Consequently, the mass only calls for organ and a small string ensemble. The tiny space also informs a curious feature of this mass: the text of both the Gloria and Credo movements is compressed, with each vocal part singing a separate section of the text simultaneously. Only in the Benedictus movement do we find an unhurried development of musical themes passed back and forth between the soprano and organ. Unusually for the time, many copies of the Little Organ Mass were preserved, including several in Joseph Haydn's own handwriting. It was reused guite frequently in various forms. The most well-known example is that the composer's brother Michael Haydn re-wrote the Gloria (originally only 31 bars!) in a much more expansive form without the telescoped text and with the addition of two trumpet parts. Copies made after 1790, once strictures on the use of instruments in sacred settings had been relaxed, often feature multiple additional wind parts. Here, we present Little Organ Mass with its original form and instrumentation.

Fantasia on Veni Emmanuel (Martin Dicke)

Written in memory of American Kantorei founder Rev. Robert Bergt, contemporary composer Martin Dicke has made a modern motet of an old tune. The Latin text to O Come, O Come, Emmanuel was first published in Cologne in 1710 and has been slowly translated and expanded over the centuries. However, it was not linked to the familiar tune until 1851. The melody actually dates back much farther than the text, all the way back to the 1400s, and possibly even earlier. Most translations pair the tune with seven verses, each beginning with a different name of God.

Ding Dong Merrily on High (Howard Helvey)

The composer of the original carol is debated but it is thought have been a dance tune in France in the mid 1500s. The lyrics were added much later, by English composer George Ratcliffe Woodward in 1924. Howard Helvey has arranged this vibrant setting for choir and four-hand piano.

The Wild Wood Carol (John Rutter)

John Rutter is not as well known in the United States as he is in the UK, where he is a household name and widely considered a national musical treasure. He has written for choirs large and small, a wide range of orchestral work, television scores, and two children's operas, including "The Wind in the Willows," from which "The Wild Wood Carol" is drawn. Along with Sir David Willcocks, he edited the majority of the Carols for Choirs series, which pulls together choral pieces from across the world and across the ages, and is often a choir director's go-to guide for Christmas music.

The Time of Snow (Bob Chilcott)

The first in a series of three carols, "The Time of Snow" was composed in 1998 for the Syracuse Children's Chorus. Chilcott, like John Rutter, is a leading British composer, and travels around the world conducting, composing, and teaching. In fact, he was in Tulsa only a few weeks ago, teaching a middle school choral clinic and conducting his "St. John Passion" with the Tulsa Oratorio Chorus and Symphony Orchestra.

Fairest Lord Jesus (Mark Hayes)

Renowned pianist and composer Mark Hayes has arranged a gorgeous setting of the Crusader's Hymn tune. Contrary to popular belief, the tune has nothing to do with German soldiers at the height of the Crusades. It is in fact a Silesian folk song published in 1842 and popularized by Franz Liszt's oratorio "The Legend of St. Elizabeth." The English text is also known under the names "Beautiful Saviour" and "The Spring Carol."

Peace, Peace (Rick and Sylvia Powell, arr. Fred Bock)

The title page of this piece contains an unusual boast: "Over 500,000 copies in print!" Hard to believe for a piece of choral music, but true! A Christmas classic since the 1970s, "Peace, Peace" is a simple yet beautiful melody that entwines with the familiar Silent Night. Now let us all sing together!
